ITUC-Africa Statement on the 2023 International Migrants Day

Migrants represent a powerful force for development in both their home and host countries. Their diverse skills, knowledge, and contributions enrich societies and economies. Managed effectively, migration stands as a cornerstone for sustainable development, offering opportunities for progress and prosperity.

In line with the Sustainable Development Goals outlined during the 2030 Agenda, we emphasize the urgency for people-centred and evidence-based solutions that empower individuals to remain in their communities or facilitate safe and dignified migration when desired or necessary.
